

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Exploring Our Faith

We are all on a life journey of discovery and Christians describe this as their spiritual journey, their journey of faith. At the heart of being a disciple of Jesus is our faith, but what does this actually mean? Before we can begin to explore our faith we need to understand what it is. In his book 'To Love and To Serve' Jonathan Draper describes faith as knowing enough to get on with, but having knowledge that is incomplete, limited and partial. The Bible interprets faith as trust, reliance or fidelity.

Christ has faith in his absolute unity with God. His is a personal response to God's blessing. We strive to be more Christ-like and therefore need to make that personal response of faith too. Faith is not an intellectual passive thing, but a radical and total commitment to Christ; a conscious human act and experience.

Martha explored her faith when she made time to be with Jesus after Lazarus died. She moved from a general statement of belief to a personal response of faith after she heard Jesus say, 'I am the resurrection and the life...'.

But faith cannot be explored in unity with God alone. We also need unity with each other for our faith to grow. We need to respond and act together as members of the body of Christ. We need to learn with, and from, each other; open our eyes to see the world as God sees it and share this with others; ask questions of ourselves; and not be afraid to ask questions of others and God.

No journey of discovery is the same but if we want to move forward in faith we have to consciously step out into the unknown and put absolute trust in God to guide us.

The Church of England is part of the world-wide Anglican Communion and is organised into two provinces; each led by an archbishop (Canterbury for the Southern Province and York for the Northern). These two provinces cover England, the Isle of Man, the Channel Islands, the Isles of Scilly and even a small part of Wales.

Each province is built from dioceses. There are 43 in England and the Diocese in Europe has clergy and congregations in the rest of Europe, Morocco, Turkey and the Asian countries of the former Soviet Union.

Each diocese (except Europe) is divided into parishes. The parish is the heart of the Church of England. Each parish is overseen by a parish priest (often called a vicar or rector). From ancient times through to today, they, and their bishop, are responsible for the 'cure of souls' in their parish. That includes everyone. And this explains why parish priests are so involved with the key issues and problems affecting the whole community.

Within each diocese, individual parishes and benefices (combined parishes) are grouped into deaneries.

The current position.

Our benefice (St. Peter and St. Paul, Ospringe; St. Mary, Eastling; St. Mary, Stalisfield and St. Lawrence, Otterden.), currently led by Revd. Penny Fenton as Priest in Charge, comes within the Deanery of Ospringe, which covers Faversham and the surrounding area, and is led by Revd. Tony Oehring as Area Dean. The Ospringe Deanery is in the Diocese of Canterbury, in the Province of Canterbury.

Looking Ahead in faith

That is our current position - but.... with fewer people coming forward for training and ordination to be priests and, with smaller congregations unable to pay for a full time priest as well as keeping our wonderful, but ancient, buildings in good repair. For some years now, parishes have had to combine into larger groups and share a priest. Over the coming months there will be small changes to some parish groupings within our Ospringe Deanery.

What will change?

Revd. Fenton retires on 30th September. The church parish of Ospringe will then be in an 'interregnum', i.e. temporarily without a Priest in Charge. In the future, Ospringe parish will share a priest with Davington & Brents, currently also in an interregnum. This vacancy will be advertised and when a priest is appointed he, or she, will live in the Vicarage at Davington, but be responsible for both Ospringe and Davington. (Oare and Luddenham, previously linked with Davington, will now be linked with Teynham.)

The parishes of Eastling and Stalisfield with Otterden will also be in interregnum, but will have Revd. Angela Cheeseman as their curate. They will join with the 'Downsfoot Group', that is: Throwley, Badlesmere with Leaveland, Sheldwich and Selling in 2006.

Norman Fowler and Hugh Perks, our Readers, are Licensed to the existing benefice and will continue as before, serving Ospringe, Eastling and Stalisfield with Otterden, though Hugh is off duty at present.

Who will be in charge?

During an interregnum the Church Wardens are in charge of their respective churches and under the spiritual leadership of the Area Dean. The PCCs (Parochial Church Councils) will meet, as usual, to manage the affairs of the church.

Does this affect Whitehill Chapel?

The Methodist circuit is run entirely separately, but there is a joint agreement with Ospringe Anglican parish, which is why sometimes services are led by members of Ospringe and Eastling churches. (Please see next page)

What happens to weekly services?

The regular service pattern in individual churches will remain mostly unchanged, with the exception of a new Morning Prayer at Eastling on the third Sunday each month. Sunday schools and youth groups will continue as they are, as will study and prayer groups. Please contact your church wardens for further details.

What about baptisms, weddings and funerals?

From October for general enquiries and for specific enquiries about Baptisms and Weddings, please telephone Faversham 531044 for Ospringe, or 01795 890629 for Eastling, Stalisfield and Otterden. If you would like the parish staff to conduct a funeral, either in our churches or elsewhere, please ask the funeral director to make the necessary arrangements.

And the Good News...?

A message from our new Deacon



Greetings! My name is Angela Cheeseman and I have just been appointed as the curate of the parishes of Eastling and Stalisfield with Otterden. I look forward to meeting you if we haven't met before-please give me a ring (the number is in the middle of the magazine) if you would like a visit or to visit me.

I have lived in Eastling for the last 23 years. My husband Peter and I brought up our three children here, while I worked as a doctor in Maidstone and Peter as a publisher in London. When I retired from medicine four years ago I felt that God was calling me to become a priest. I entered the training school at Canterbury, and was ordained on July 2nd, this year, in the Cathedral. It was wonderful to have so many friends there to share the service and the celebration afterwards - a fantastic party in Eastling Village Hall was thrown entirely by people in the parishes. Thank you everyone- I shall never forget it.

I was planning to start work in the parishes in August, but the unexpected has happened. I developed septic arthritis after a minor knee operation on July 7; became ill while taking a week's holiday in Spain; and arrived back to be whisked into hospital for antibiotics and three operations to help clear the infection. I have only just got home and it's already nearly the end of August. Regretfully, I don't think I shall be back to normal before some time in September.

I have been thinking of you and praying for you while I have been ill. It is going to be an exciting year for youth in our parishes in the year to come, as S-club is launching a special session for teenagers to run concurrently with the present very popular session for younger children on Sunday morning. Also, Lorraine Hanney, the lady who teaches "Cordon bleu" cookery in the village school, is organising a competition for floral or other (non food) creations to illustrate "Feed the World" for the Harvest

Festival on Oct 2. Leigh Dyson and Liz Bell are trying to attract a Youth Worker to provide more activities for teenagers, particularly a youth club. I hope to carry on with the puppet club, directly I can leap around again!

As regards adults, I hope that the Church might be able to help in ways not perhaps considered before. Have you any suggestions? Please let me know if you have. Watch this space next month for ideas.

There is going to be a change at Eastling at 10am from Holy Communion to Morning Prayer once a month on the third Sunday, from October onwards. I know some will be disappointed, but Morning Prayer is a beautiful service which is more accessible to those who don't feel able to take communion, and it will hopefully be welcomed by some.

Do let me know your thoughts on these and any ideas you may have to help us all live our lives closer to God and to serve each other. Jesus said "I am the vine and you are the branches. If a man(woman) remains in me and I in him(her), he(she) will bear much fruit." May this be so for us.




