I grew up in a Christian household, but my parents left the decision to me over whether I'd decide to become a Christian. I attended church regularly with them and built up a nucleus of friends there, but ultimately I was left to make my own choice.

When I was 11 I attended a 'Saltmine' camp, which was a Christian summer camp. I got this amazing buzz through being in the meetings — a kind of spiritual 'high' - and this was the first time I began to feel like God was real. I made a decision that week that I would follow Jesus.

However, life quickly settled back into its status quo and a few years later I found myself fairly unhappy, and so looked to my Bible for help. I continued attending summer camps and, aged 14, felt a renewed sense of purpose. I decided that year to get baptised, and this is when I believe I truly became a Christian. I didn't want to just be a Sunday Christian and I wanted my faith to be for always. I didn't want to lose the feeling that I got at these camps and I knew that was only achievable through getting to know God better.

Since that point my life has slowly flourished. I began standing up for my faith at school and to my surprise people began to accept it. Of course there's a lot of banter around these sorts of things, but actually I've felt enabled to strengthen my friendships with people and tell them about God. I've begun reading my Bible more and have found that the more things I give over to God (exams, sports, etc.) the more things seem to grow and prosper.

I now have a solid church family, and a sense of belonging that is so important. I've now cofounded a Christian website for teenagers, and I've even begun to preach, which is something I'm extremely passionate about for the future. Loads of exciting things have happened since I became a Christian!



We have all enjoyed strawberries, raspberries, cherries, and many vegetables as they have come into One of my fondest season. memories comes from the time my wife and I were engaged. Free help available from Kent Fire and **Rescue Service**

Kent Fire and Rescue Service (KFRS) offers free safety advice and a range of free services to ensure vulnerable members of the community are safeguarded from the risk of fire.

Just three breaths of fire smoke can be life-threatening and sadly, it is often older residents, or those with mobility problems, physical or mental health issues or impaired sight or hearing, who are injured by fire.

Where needed, KFRS community safety team can provide free home safety visits. These take around 30 minutes and include advice on escape routes, night time safety routines and fire hazards in the home and, if needed, the fitting of free smoke alarms.

John the Baptist, An angel - Gabriel appeared to Mary to tell her that she would be

the mother of the Messiah, the Son of God. An angel appeared 'in a dream' to Joseph, the village carpenter in Nazareth, to tell him to go ahead and marry his fiancee, Mary, and later - also in a dream - warned him not to go back to Bethlehem. A 'young man', whom we take to have been an angel, was sitting in the empty tomb on Easter morning, waiting to tell the startled women that Jesus wasn't there - he had risen (Mark 16:5).

Without going into every biblical reference to angels, those should be sufficient to show that the word covers an enormous diversity of experience. So the Letter to the Hebrews speaks of those who practice hospitality as sometimes 'entertaining angels unawares'. Sometimes people recognised angels for who they were, and sometimes they didn't. Angels, quite simply, are God's agents or emissaries, messengers and ministers of his will. Sometimes they are human; sometimes they seem to be spiritual beings.

Perhaps we could even say that anyone, in any situation, who is at that moment God's 'messenger' to us, or serves us graciously, is an 'angel'. So when we say, 'Oh, be an angel and pop up to the chemist for my prescription', we may be nearer the heart of the matter than we

People and Places from the Past

Harvest time was always the most important season in the farming year. Many helpers were needed to gather in the corn: family, friends and neighbours as well as regular farm hands. Nobody who wanted a casual job was turned away.

Cutting the corn started in August. The binder was towed by either horses or tractors. The photo above is of Ray Elvey and his father Tom cutting corn at Frith Farm.

Knives, which had to be sharpened regularly, moved to and fro at the front of the binder between steel fingers. Wooden sails rotated bringing the corn onto the canvas which carried it up to be bound with binder string to the knotter. Then it was cut and thrown out in straight rows as sheaves. Next came many workers to





'shock' the sheaves. Eight or ten sheaves were stood up in a row to allow the air to pass through. The old saying was 'to leave them until the church bells had rung on three Sundays'. This enabled the ears and straw to dry and ripen. In September the wagons would be loaded, two people pitching and two loading, and taken to the stack yard.

The next photo is Ray and Tom building a stack using a 60 stave ladder to reach the top. Corn stacks were usually round, 21 foot in diameter, with a base of old straw, faggots or hop bines. When finished they awaited

the thatchers. If there was no farm worker skilled in the art of thatching, local thatchers would move in, being paid by the 'square'. The stacks were thatched as soon as possible to keep

> the corn dry until threshing. This excellent photo was taken in 1949 showing the finished stacks all thatched at Wingfield Farm.



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




