


In fact, the more people from outside church congregations

#### Canon's Column

At the present in the midst of our commemorations of the centenary of the beginning of World War I, the 'war to end all wars', we are faced with the outbreak of hostilities between the Palistinians in Gaza and Israel, the pro-Russian conflicts within the Ukraine, and the fundamentalist takeover of parts of Syria and Iraq. There are also active conflicts in parts of Africa, Asia and in other parts of the Middle East.

As Christians, we are praying regularly for peace in our world and when we pray for peace we must always pray for justice because justice is the only real foundation for peace. As we listen to the news, we hear calls for our government and other world leading countries to become involved in bringing about a cessation to these various hostilities or at least to intervene to protect the victims of the situations.

What are we to do as Christians?

What is the real Christian stand when we are faced with aggression and war?

There have been two approaches to this question throughout the history of the Christian Church. Both have claimed scriptural, theological and philosophical support as an accepted or the accepted Christian position. Also both have added much to our history, culture and ethics.

The first position is that of pacifism. The Christian pacifist understands that Christ represents a way of non violence, of suffering love, of self sacrifice. Christian pacifist would suggest that Christ himself condemned the use of violence and that war is wrong and evil, is never morally justified and is incompatible with Christ's way in the world.

is generally called the Just War Theory. Christians who accept this position would consider themselves to be realists. We live in a world in which evil is still rampant while humanity's inhumanity to humanity is caused by greed, fear, self-interest, self protection and the acquisition of power or at least a re-building of power. But having accepted this understanding of the fractured and sinful nature of the world, the Christian proponent of the Just War Theory argues that there is still a morality to war and that the war must be the last resort to pursue the genuine good for all people. Christians believe that we are all answerable to God for the actions and conduct of our lives and that our motives are subject to divine judgement as much as our actions. Therefore, violence which is ordinarily wrong, can be, for Christians, morally acceptable when the needs of humanity and the common good demand it. The Just War Theory

Both positions have a strong heritage within our Christian community and history. Some significant groups and denominations have held the pacifist position, sometimes at considerable cost, ridicule discrimination, persecution and even expulsion or forced migration. Scholars who have taught from the pacifist position have influenced the whole of Christendom

provides the guidance for Christians

in respect to entering into war, jus ad

bellum, and how warfare should be

conducted, jus in bello.

with some of their insights. Within the Anglican Communion, we have had theologians and church leaders who have been committed pacifists. One of the early leaders in the Ecumenical movement. Bishop George Bell of Chichester was one such example in the 1930's, 40's and 50's. He worked hard to use moral suasion to find alternatives to the violence of warfare. The German theologian and martyr, Dietrich Bonhoeffer was initially a committed pacifist, but came to understand the need for the use of violence to destroy the evil of Nazism.

The Just War Theory has had a broad range of supporters and proponents and has provided the moral and spiritual foundation and resources for many leaders in government, society and the military.

Several times in this column, I have discussed some of the controversial topics that are facing our society. I have endeavoured to present all sides of the question with fairness and respect and with enough understanding that individuals would be able to engage with the question from a spiritual perspective. On this question, I think it is only fair to tell you that while I have had friends and colleagues who are dedicated pacifists and I have been inspired and stimulated by my study of pacifist theology, I hold to the Christian realist understanding of the Just War Theory. Some years ago a cup dated 1908 was resurrected and the inter village Tug of War challenge between Stalisfield



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#### THE GREAT WAR: LIFE ON THE HOME FRONT by David Winter, a former Head of Religious Broadcasting at the BBC

THE GREAT WAR 1914 - 1918

Until the Great War, battles had been fought by soldiers in designated places: Bosworth Field, Bannockburn, Agincourt, Waterloo, and

roles in war were as remote spectators of the conflict - and occasionally victims of the victors. When the wars happened in far-away places, people only heard of them long after they were over, if at all. However, the Great War was new and different. Since the Napoleonic Wars and even the Boer War of the 19th century, many things had changed. One was the advent of the daily newspaper - cheap, instant and popular. The papers ensured that their readers knew what was going on, and with the invention of the telephone at the end of the Victorian era, the reports from correspondents could be immediate and vivid. The internal combustion engine now propelled buses and lorries - and eventually tanks and armoured cars. And the invention of the aeroplane and its rapid development in the early years of the War brought a whole new dimension to conflict. It was no longer local, fought out on 'battle fields', but anywhere that the combatants came together. The submarine, the Zeppelin and the aeroplane were to play significant roles in this new kind of warfare.

All of which meant that everyone in the warring nations felt involved. They were spectators no longer, but participants. All over Britain the arsenals were buzzing with activity, producing the vast quantities of shells and bombs which were being hurled across the trenches on the western front. As most of the men were in the forces, those vital munitions

were largely made by women. For the first time, in many cases, women from the



poorer sections of society were able to earn a decent wage in the munitions factories, or in other jobs previously seen as exclusively male.

The civilian population also experienced the war in more immediate ways. London was bombed - first by the

Zeppelin airships, and later by aircraft. Casualties were low - about a thousand civilians - and the attacks infrequent, but they were a cruel reminder that modern war knows no frontiers. Late in the War the German navy tightened its grip on the major seaways, largely through the activity of submarines, and food shortages became a problem.

The mood of the nation remained positive, however. The newspapers tended to present events on the western front in a patriotic way, disguising to some extent the true horror of what was going on. It was widely accepted that we were fighting in a noble cause. The Allies were on a mission to save the world. In a famous sermon, the Bishop of London called on the nation to kill Germans, 'not for the sake of killing . . . but lest the civilisation of the world itself should be killed'.

That mood began to change as the years rolled on and the casualty figures (which were published daily) got higher and higher. There was never any significant 'anti-war' movement as such, but more a general feeling that things just couldn't go on like this. Something would have to give if that 'civilisation' was to survive. But in the end it was economics, not military tactics, that decided the day.

"I'm concerned about the incorrect information given in the Open Letter from the Horses of Eastling in the last Good News where the author(s) state: "we don't mind sharing our bridleways with other users". They are not "our bridleways" they are shared in law between cyclists, horses and walkers. Once an incorrect statement, written through ignorance, gets into print people may believe it is true.

I would be glad if you would publish a correction in the new issue to the effect that

Under the Highways Act the use of bridleways is shared equally between horse riders, walkers and cyclists. Walkers have exclusive use of footpaths, unfortunately horse riders frequently ride footpaths, and in muddy conditions leave deep hoof prints which make for uncertain walking.

The legal definitions are:

#### **Footpaths**

This public right of way is meant for pedestrians only. Prams, push chair or wheelchairs can also be used on a footpath.

#### **Bridleways**

These are meant for walkers, horse riders and bicyclists. Bicyclists are expected to give way to walkers and horse riders."
