Eastling School News


We start the new school year on Thursday 3rd September. Please note we have been warned of a potential closure of Kettle Hill Road at this key time that may be chaotic!

The school is due to receive a visit from our OfSTED colleagues and, since our last visit, we have been commended as a Top 100 school nationally and still maintain the "good with outstanding" category from the last inspection.



Canon's Column

Two articles in the newspaper recently have caught my attention. One was an open letter from a group of religious leaders supporting the Right to Die initiative that is presently before parliament. The other was about ITV presenter, Tom Brady and his attempt to save a suicidal Greek man. Two things about the Tom Brady story stand out; in his account he said that only one of the ten or so police or other uniformed officers made any attempt to save the man or assist him. Secondly, a comment was made that suicides, particularly amongst pensioners and the elderly have increased considerably in Greece since their economic troubles began.

The Right to Die?

The Right to Die question has received considerable media attention with various articles about people travelling to Europe in order to take advantage of very lax laws in certain countries. There was even the case of a perfectly healthy woman who decided to end her life because after working for years in a palliative care setting, she did not want to end up there. As much as I can sympathize with people who are in almost continuous pain and see no point in continuing to live, I have several serious reservations about the right to suicide and assisted suicide. People who are in these positions are more often at the most vulnerable points of their lives and it seems to me that we are allowing others to take advantage of these people.

The Greek people who are being squeezed by the cuts in pension and social benefits because of the financial problems the country is facing are also at a vulnerable point in their lives. They see no way out of the situation that has been thrust upon them and are engulfed with worry and despair. Are we going to allow and by allowing, encourage suicide as a solution to problems we don't want to become involved with?

Thomas Joiner, professor of psychology at Florida State University has studied and written extensively on suicide. His books, "Why People Die by Suicide" and "Myths about Suicide", were considered to be among the best and most readable resources in the field of suicide studies and prevention just a few years ago. He has a very simple understanding about what leads to suicide and the lethality of any attempt at suicide. And his understanding is really most applicable to the question of the right to assisted suicide.

Professor Joiner suggests that there are three conditions necessary for suicide to be considered or attempted. The first is what he has called 'thwarted belongingness.' This is basically the understanding that the individual is all alone in his or her plight. We most often see this in the suicides of those who have gone through a traumatic divorce or separation or in the case of a teenager who has become alienated from his or her family or been rejected by the peer group. Seniors who have no ongoing contact with family and friends and who are physically or socially housebound also fit into this category.

The second condition that sets up the desire for suicide or to end life is what is termed 'perceived burdensomeness'. The person who has dysfunctional or problem relationships with others might come to feel that he or she is a burden to family, friends or the system. Sometimes people have the feeling that others would be better off without them and they have a great disconnect with others. They can potentially be a high risk for suicide or have a wish to die.

To say that assisted suicide is wrong and to say that it is not an acceptable alternative to the problems facing an individual or a culture is not enough.

Those who are in the depths of their emotional and physical condition must be provided with alternatives that contribute to good emotional health and wellbeing.

If we accept the conclusions of Professor Joiner's research, then we must find ways not only of denying the lethal means but also of alleviating the problems of loneliness and detachment and the sense of burdensomeness. Recent research here in the UK has suggested that seniors who are actively involved with their church community have fewer emotional problems and are happier than those who are not. Another recent newspaper article suggested that seniors might be happier and more productive living in senior communities such as are available in many areas of Canada and the US. These communities have senior sized and planned housing units with community activity centres including recreation and exercise facilities, often with a pool, garden allotment and even wood workshops and artists' studios. There are often guest suites available for visiting families at nominal rent.

For a number of years organizations such as AGE UK has worked with communities and churches to deal with the ways in which ageing affects social contacts and isolated people. More needs to be done in this regard. New and creative ways need to be found to meet the needs of any in our society who are alone and out of contact with family and friends.

The problem of burdensomeness is really a significant one for many who rely on our social care system. The short home care visits and the discernment process for allocating home care and other support for disabled people and seniors all contribute to the sense that these people are a burden to society. As a society we need to work to prevent people from feeling that they are a burden to others by making sure that sufficient resources are available to provide the proper care for all people. Let's not allow the vulnerable people in our society feel that the only option open to them is through a Right to Die Bill.

Seven years ago I started on a journey....

I had no idea where that journey would lead but I knew it was one I had to travel. I attended a weekend introductory course in healing and wholeness; dipping my toe into work within the church. That led to more courses, these courses lead to courses within the diocese and one made me focus on what God was calling me to do. However being an ambitious person how was I to be sure it was God talking to me and not my inner ambition. More courses, more soul searching, I was directed down paths which lead nowhere! I was frustrated, unsure what God was telling me to do. My faith assured me that if one door closed God would open another, and he did. Two years ago I was before a selection panel, I was questioned, I met others whose own journeys had led them to that same day, that same panel, that same uncertainty "was this what God was calling us all to". A few of us went over to the cathedral afterwards to wait for the decision. It was time of prayer and waiting but we weren't alone. When that phone call arrived part of me worried about rejection, part of me worried whether I up to this new challenge? I answered the phone wondering if this would change the direction of my life. I had been accepted, now the hard work began.

As a single mum, working full time I was about to embark on a four year university course to become a reader. Was I mad? Would I be able to cope with all the reading, study of theology and writing academic assignments? I have had to do a placement in another parish, meeting new people, taking part in services different to my own. I have been away studying for whole weekends. Now, two years on and six passed assessments under my belt, I have been approved for licensing.

What does being a Reader mean? What does a Reader do?

A Reader is a lay person trained and authorised to preach and teach. They can bridge the gap between the work place, communities and the church.

What happens after licensing?

I have two more years of post licensing study to do and more assignments to write and pass. I can lead services, can preach and teach and serve God within my work place, my parish, the church and in my community. I will still be me, a hard working mum, and will continue to work within Adult education. I have made some good friends on my course; received some good support from those around me. My faith has strengthened and I see things differently. I have had to rise to new challenges, to preach sermons and to stand up for what I believe.

My licensing takes place at Canterbury Cathedral on 20th September. The service starts at 6.30. I will be presented with my Reader's scarf at this service and will stand proudly alongside those who shared the journey with me, walked their own path to get to that point. We will be surrounded by all those who supported us and share the one moment together, all as the family of God. If you would like to share this moment with us, please feel free to come to the cathedral, the service is open to all.

I would like to thank everyone who has supported me, prayed for me, guided me and done the practical things to ensure I could do this worthwhile study. Most of all I would like to thank my son, Ryan, who was quiet when I needed to study, stayed out of my way as I wrote my assignments, was patient as I practised my sermons and accepted being shipped off to family when I was on study days or weekends. I know it hasn't been an easy two years and I realise I am only half way, but thank you Ryan for being supportive as I followed and answered God's call.
