

Canon's Column

A Christian's thoughts after the Terrorist Attacks

These past weeks we have been splattered by the news of several terrorist attacks, the Nice truck massacre, the Munich McDonald's shootings, and the martyrdom of Père Jacques Hamel in front of a church altar in France where he was celebrating Mass. The news sends us reeling through a range of emotions. We ask ourselves, "What can we do?"

I would suggest that we start by recognizing our own feelings and then try to understand what is happening to us. One of our initial feelings is anguish and upset. We ask, "Why?" And we feel overwhelmed by the horror of the incident. Another feeling is anger - Someone has to stop this! *Someone must pay for it!* We want to retaliate in some way. And coupled with these feeling is fear. It could happen here! I could have been there! What would happen to me if something like this happened when I am on holiday? These feelings are real and powerful and we all have them. But if we give in to them then the terrorists have gained and we have lost. These feelings emerge from our most basic, reactive brain processes, they are automatic responses. But, is this the way we really want to respond? By reacting at this level, we are allowing the terrorists to dictate our own actions, to control us. How do we

respond when we use our more sophisticated, rational and morally based decision making processes?

The terrorists have chosen to look at the world from a "them or us" basis. They want to divide society into their kind and the other group and when we react with fear, anger and retaliation, we are helping them to build that wall and destroy the relationships we may have with our neighbours from another country or religion. We are allowing them to fulfil their goal of separating and controlling people on the basis of race, religion or culture.

Our Christian Faith calls us to live above our most basic fears and raw emotions. We can have them as initial reactions, but as we acknowledge them, we then choose to respond from the power and resources that come from our Christian values, from Christ living in our lives. So where do we start with our Christian response?

I would like to think that our first starting point is to accept others as our neighbours. We have the parable of the Good Samaritan, Luke 10. 25-35, which is really focused on not the goodness of the Samaritan, the outsider, but the reality of him being the neighbour whose response was

based on his values not his fears. The others, who passed by the victim, responded out of fear, fear of becoming another victim, fear of becoming involved, fear of being inconvenienced in scheduled duties. They reacted at their most basic level. But the Samaritan responded to the needs before him from a higher level, he set aside his fear of the robbers, he set aside his schedule, he involved himself in the care and costs of meeting the victim's needs, the needs of someone from another culture. So for us, as we deal with our reactions to a terrorist incident, we consciously choose not to allow our fears and reactions to build barriers between us and those who are different from us.

This is the beginning of our Christian response to these terrible incidents. We then can slowly reach out in reconciliation to bring healing and renewal to our society and our world. At the moment I am looking again at writers such as Canon Andrew White, Faith Under Fire: Oliver Schuegraf, The Cross of Nails (about the reconciliation ministry of Coventry Cathedral); and the Croatian theologian Miroslav Volf. Perhaps you might like to look them up on Wikipedia and get a flavour of their ideas. I will write further on this topic in another issue. If any one would like to talk about anything in this column, do not hesitate to call me at the Rectory.



We have harvested kale, garlic, carrots, courgettes, beans and more, and are beginning to think of ways that we could market surplus produce next year! We have saved one planting area for rhubarb and, if

- anyone plans to divide their own rhubarb this autumn, we would be very grateful for any spare plants.
- The new wildflower section had a slow start, but provided a good talking point, with some mixed comments from everyone passing by.
- In June, the Group received a Gold Award from the Ashford Access Group, in recognition of the easily accessible design of the gardens, which means they can be enjoyed and worked in by people with any degree of disability.

Stef Reid – Christian paralympic athlete on her way to Rio

Stef Reid is a paralympic athlete. She does long-jump and also sprints. In the 2008 Paralympics she won a bronze medal in the 200 metres and in 2012, a silver medal in th long jump. She has broken the world record for long-jump in the F44 (below the knee amputees) class several times.

She had a life-changing accident in her teens as she describes: "I was in a boating accident when I was 16. The propellers caught me across my lower back. The water around me was blood red. I thought I had been cut in half. The next issue was that we were three hours away from a half-decent hospital.

"I survived but unfortunately the leg was so mangled that it had to be amputated. So I was really thankful to be alive. But with my love for sport, I was absolutely devastated. The stuff that vou love to do, you are told that you cannot do it any more.

"I don't come from a Christian family but my parents sent me to a Christian

school. We had Bible classes. I had a very good head knowledge of the Bible but it wasn't a major part of my life.

"Everything changed when I was in the accident. I remember lying in the ambulance. I was scared because I knew in my heart that I wasn't going to heaven. I did not know God. I had never asked Him what His plan was for my life. I remember praying for a second chance. It was a complete miracle that I survived the accident. I know that God had a hand in that.

"I also know that by me not dying, I still had a purpose here. There is a reason for me to be here and it completely changed my perspective. It changed me as a person and I committed my life to Him in the ambulance. Now, I look at things from the perspective of hope. I have always got hope. I think that is the biggest difference".

In September 2016 Stef will represent Britain in the Paralympics in Rio.






