Water, water, everywhere... But...?

As I write we are about to enter a time of a hose-pipe ban with the request that we conserve our use of water as much as possible. We have had hose-pipe bans in the past. A number of years ago, when our 3 boys were young we had a relatively hot summer (not as hot as this one) and we eventually went out and

bought a really good and big paddling pool for the garden, only it seems as soon as we had bought it for a hose-pipe ban to be applied so we never got to use it that particular summer.

This year comparisons have been made to the summer of 1976, another hot summer. I remember being given (supervised) breaks during exams for a chance to have a drink and cool off before resuming again in a very hot room. I, as I do now, lived in Kent, but my wife Jane lived in Yorkshire and she remembers stand pipes being set-up in the streets as water to the houses was cut off. She tells me that her mum got her to collect water from the stand pipes not only for her house but for all the neighbours was well!

It is easy to become expectant on the provision of clean, fresh water on tap, and of course in many parts of the world that is true, but for many others it is not and the work of charities such as Water Aid is really important in providing clean water to communities that, as yet, do not have that facility.

Water, of course is key to life plant, animal and human life. Water, is significant in the gospels, not only in baptism but also for true life itself.

In John's gospel we find Jesus on a journey through Samaria. A journey, of course then, meant walking. It was hot and no doubt thirst making. Jesus comes to a well and whilst his disciples go into the town for food, he rests at the well. A



woman comes to draw water and he asks the woman for a drink. Now as a good Jew in those days he certainly shouldn't have been asking a Samaritan, let alone a Samaritan woman, but Jesus is one to break through the normal conventions. He was thirsty and asked for some

water.

But then the conversation takes a different path:

Jesus says to her, "If you knew the gift of God and who it is that asks you for a drink, you would have asked him and he would have given you living water." (John 4:10) and.

Jesus said, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life." (John 4:13-14)

A little later on Jesus attended one of the Jewish festivals in Jerusalem and on the last and greatest day of the festival, Jesus stood and said in a loud voice, "Let anyone who is

But at this time of a relative water shortage it is good to reflect on the importance of and the care of our water resources; to reflect on those who are constantly short of the abundance of water that we share, and to have the opportunity to reflect on the water of life that Jesus offers us all.

Being grateful

World Gratitude Day (yes, it really does exist!) is on 21st September.

It may not be widely observed this year, for these have not been easy times in which to feel grateful. Coronavirus turned our lives upside down, and now we have the war in Ukraine, and the alarming rise in the cost of living. Add to that the heat waves, the wildfires, and the widespread drought of this past summer, and what is there to be particularly thankful about?

To put it another way, how, as Christians, can we be grateful during disasters? Should we even *try* to be grateful? The letters of St Paul give us some pointers.

First of all, he says that we are not to be terrified when bad things happen. Instead, "Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God." Then, "let the peace of God rule in our hearts, to which also you were called in one body; and be thankful" (Colossians 3:15)

Again, in 1 Thessalonians 5:18 Paul urges: "In everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." It is not that we should thank God for losing our jobs or other disasters; it is rather that we need to keep our eve on the bigger picture, and never forget

what God has blessed us with in Jesus Christ.

Giving thanksgiving to God is a sure sign of the fruit of His Spirit in our lives. In fact, a thankless attitude is abnormal for a Christian! It goes against everything that is in our new life. No wonder that the NT continually calls us back to thankfulness.

And there is good reason for this. Romans 8:28 assures us: "We know that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are the called according to his purpose." So even when things are bad. Paul assures us that we can be sure that God has not abandoned us, but instead will stand by us through the hard times.

The early church, whenever they gathered, gave thanks together. Whenever we meet for fellowship with believers, it is good to include a time of giving thanks.

But even when we are on our own, each day we can make time to be "singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord." (Eph 5:18). We can be "giving thanks always for all things to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ." (Eph 5:20)

Nigel Beeton writes: "September is a time when we begin the celebration of harvest, and the rhythms of the seasons that lead up to it. But, as this Summer shows, the seasons have been disturbed. My cousins are farmers in Suffolk, and it has been so dry this year that they couldn't even drill one field until June.... So our harvest celebrations this year must be tempered with a humble awareness of the part we've played in upsetting the rhythms of creation."

Volunteering at the Lambeth Conference 2022

God's Church for God's world

Convened by the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lambeth Conference is an international meeting of Anglican bishops. It meets once every 10 years and 2022 was the 15th such meeting. The conference discusses church and world affairs and the global mission of the Anglican Communion for the decade ahead. It was scheduled to meet two years ago however due to the pandemic it was postponed and was finally able to go ahead this year. I first volunteered two years ago and honestly had forgotten about it until this year when arrangements were being made. As I work full time, I was only able to offer my time at the weekend.

The Lambeth conference took place at the University of Kent starting on the 26th July and ending on the 8th August. 650 Bishops from all over the world attended along with approximately 300 spouses. There was a programme of events for the spouses as well as the Bishops. The programme involved services at Canterbury Cathedral, bible study, mission meetings, reception with the Archbishop of Canterbury and a day at Lambeth palace. The Bishops had a full programme starting at 6.30 with morning prayer every day closing with night prayer at 9.30pm.

It was hoped that 150 people would volunteer their time to assist in ensuring the Bishops found there way around the campus and various sessions were set up, however only 80 volunteers were found. Each volunteer was provided with a blue high vis jacket and a red baseball cap with the Lambeth Conference logo on. My slots were on full days both Saturday and Sunday both weekends to fit around my full-time job. On the first Saturday we had to rearrange the main venue from rowed seating to table setting to allow for group discussions, this took some arranging, 92 tables needed putting up with 8 chairs per table and then each had a tablecloth and the paperwork necessary. Volunteers also had to be around the campus to assist the Bishops and their spouses get from one venue to another.

The first Sunday morning we had to ensure we got every Bishop and spouse on to the buses in order for them to be taken to Canterbury town centre for the opening service. At 8.30 volunteers were on the first bus, we were dropped off at Iron Bar Lane and then we had to mark out the route down to the cathedral, as everywhere was closed this proved a relatively easy task and we breathed a sigh of relief once the last bus had dropped off its passengers and all had been safely shown to the cathedral.

We knew that it wouldn't be quite so easy in reverse, we had tourists and shoppers milling around, many wanting to know why we were dressed the same, what was going on and so we explained and invited many to watch the procession of Bishops as they left the cathedral, many Bishops wanted to go off shopping but we knew that we had to keep them together, if a sheep dog can herd sheep what do you use to herd a "bench/psalter" of Bishops, (googled what the collective noun for a group of bishops was and it is bench or psalter), a big sigh of relief could be heard when the last bishop was safely on the bus and the bus was heading back to the university campus.

The following weekend things were a bit easier as by now the Bishops knew

there way around and our role was now clearing up ready for their departure. There was a closing service at the cathedral and volunteers were able to attend this service, it was a moving service, one I will never forget. Each reading was done in a different language, there were hymns from Spain, Palestine, Africa. The sermon given by the Archbishop he drew everything they had accomplished together, the prayers were also done in a variety of languages and hearing the Lord's prayer said in every language all at the same time was a sound to hear.

When the service was concluded the musicians led everybody out of the cathedral and the Bishops were dancing and enjoying themselves. They were also quick to get back on the buses, seeing as it was now 6.30pm and some had to pack, others were leaving and the rest had a BBQ to attend.

The evening concluded with a BBQ where the volunteers, stewards and Bishops with spouses all ate together on the sports field. A lot of organisation had gone into arranging this event and it was very successful, for me I will remember the grateful thanks of the Bishops as they thanked each of us on route from the cathedral for keeping them safe and together.

Canon Paul Hardingham remembers Diana, Princess of Wales...

'England's Rose'

This month marks 25 years since the funeral of Princess Diana on 6th September 1997. Prince William has described how his mother's death was like an earthquake, the shockwaves taking time to sink in. When we remember the days leading up to the funeral, the whole nation seemed touched by her death. Over 32 million people watched the funeral on television. As we look back to this event, what is its continuing significance?

As those made in the image of God, we are called to reach out to show love to others. *Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God.* '(1 John 4:7). Princess Diana did this, especially the vulnerable in our society, remembering especially her work with AIDS sufferers and landmine victims. However, she was also a flawed individual, who fought various 'demons' in her own life and struggled with relationships. People identified with her humanity as *one like us*: fallible, weak yet more than good enough.

There is always something powerful about vulnerability in others; we can identify with them because, like us, they don't have it all together. God uses flawed people in His purposes, as we clearly see in the pages of the Bible: Abraham, Moses, David and Paul, to mention just a few!

Ironically, Mother Theresa died the day before Diana's funeral. Again, she was somebody who was much loved for her work among the poor. However, despite being declared a saint last year, she openly talked about the vulnerability of her faith. Mother Teresa revealed that she spent nearly 50 years without a tangible feeling of God's presence in her life! It's not easy to be a perfect saint!

'I think the biggest disease the world suffers from in this day and age is the disease of people feeling unloved.' (Princess Diana).
