Message for September

As I write this I am recovering from covid. I have had it before but this time I was affected worse than before. I spent three days sleeping and 5 days suffering from severe dizziness. During those 5 days I wanted to get back to my normal busy life. Many people who know me know that I do a lot, work full time, my two ministries within the church and fostering! When I do sit down I am knitting or crocheting. But during those 5 days I couldn't do any of those things. I wanted to and everyone was telling me that I had to rest and give my body time to get over it. I found this very difficult, I got bored, I was worried about all the things I should be doing that weren't being done. I felt that I was letting people down. But was I? Was I expecting too much from myself, no-one was going to die if those things didn't get done. How often do we put expectations on ourselves thinking we have to do something immediately?

Well, if you're living a hectic and worried life let me say this; That is not the kind of lifestyle God wants for us. Psalm 127 verse 2 tells us "It is senseless for you to work so hard from early morning until late at night, God wants His loved ones to get their proper rest." God wants us to live a whole, balanced and complete life. This is a message I know I need.

Genesis 1 tells us that God worked 6 days and then Genesis 2 verse 2- "By the seventh day God had finished the work He had been doing; so on the seventh day He rested from all His work." Now, why did God do that? Was it because He was exhausted? Do you picture God out of breath by the 7th day, saying, "Whew! I've got to slow down! This is killing me!" No, God is all-powerful; Exodus 31 verse17 gives us the reason God rested.. "..on the seventh day He stopped working and refreshed." God stopped because He wanted to set an example for us, we all need to relax at times and be refreshed.

In order to have the balanced life God wants for us we also must realize that our lives and bodies need rest. "Six day Shall you labour, but the 7th day is a Sabbath to the Lord your God. On it you shall not do any work." Many of us grew up with what is called a good work ethic. If you're going to succeed, you must push yourself, drive yourself. If we are going to get anywhere in life we have to work hard. Things aren't handed to us on a plate. And we are such a production orientated people that it is difficult for us to change pace and rest. Well, in the middle of this rat race, God says, "I want you to take some time to rest". In fact the word "Sabbath" means rest. In Mark 2 verse 27 Jesus said. "The Sabbath day was made to help people; they were not made to be ruled by the Sabbath day." In other words, God wasn't randomly saying, "I'm going to force you to take a day off because I want it." No, Sabbath rest was given for our benefit. God designed our bodies, our emotions, & our minds to function most efficiently when we work hard but then balance that with rest.

Psalm 23 is very familiar to us all but look at verse 2 "He makes me to lie down in green pastures" and verse 3 "He restores my soul" we have to understand that there is more to our lives and our Christian lives than being busy all the time, we have to learn to slow down and rest. Something I find very difficult, but having covid has made me more aware and helped me to see that rest is just as important as being busy. If we are constantly busy where does Jesus fit in, but when we are at rest we have the time to allow him in, to work in us and make us better people of God. We must find time to rest for our bodies. If you don't take time to rest your body, your body will make time to rest itself either in the hospital or with a cold or as I found with covid. Our best requires rest. Do you feel guilty when you relax? I know I do however Jesus didn't. He took time off. Are you busier than Jesus? Is what you're doing more important than what Jesus did? We need to take time to recharge our emotions. What things recharge you emotionally? You need quietness. You need time for relationships. We need to refocus our spirits.

Jesus tells us in Matthew 11 verse 28 "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls." Basically He's saying, If you'll learn from me you'll find the load I give you to carry is light. You'll find deep, satisfying rest, A rest for your soul. Are you stressed out, tired, weary? Jesus says come to Me. I'm not going to load more on you but I'll give you true meaning, and you'll recover your life. Because: I will make you lie down in green pastures and I will lead you beside still waters." Isn't it time you really let Him do that for vou? So we need to ensure we have a truly balanced life and make time to rest and restore our bodies and souls.

Although the past 5 days have caused me to become frustrated it has also given me the time to see that God is speaking to me and I should listen. Having a busy life and being constantly on the go isn't what God created us for, we need to slow down, take time, rest and then we can become what God intended for us which is a balanced life.

There are four areas of our lives we need to balance to help us live according to God's plan and purpose for us:

1. Our top priority should be spending time with God each day. We need to read and think about God's Word, pray, listen for His voice and directions, and simply spend quality time with Him.

2. Relationships are essential to God's plans for us. We should allocate time to family and friends, since Galatians 6 verse 2 reminds us to "Share each other's burdens, and in this way obey the law of Christ."

3. The area most likely to become imbalanced is our work. The Lord doesn't want us to be overly consumed with our careers and work commitments.

4. Taking care of our body is vital, allocating adequate time for rest, recreation, and exercise.

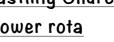

Chagall came to designing stained glass windows late in his career, collaborating with glassworker Charles Marg of Rheims. The windows are very much a modern design - the longer you look at them the more you see. The original Victorian windows are still also displayed in a specially designed backlit lightbox in the Vestry. The church is well worth visiting and we were lucky enough to be able to have a guided tour as well by the Reverend Pamela Ive. After we had spent a pleasant morning at the Church it was then lunch time, so we all paid a visit to the Poacher and Partridge pub nearby and very nice it was too!

Our August Meeting was a Fare to Share event and although finger foods were requested, there was a lot more on offer, so we all had a very convivial evening eating and drinking home made food and non alcoholic Pimms.

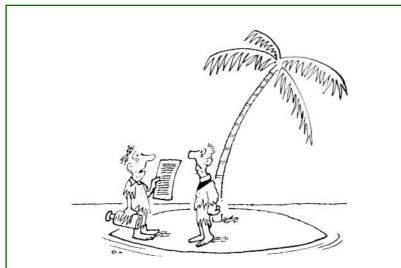

Discovering MacDonald Gill: architect, artist and mapmaker. Gill is famed for his pictorial maps, especially those for the London Underground. He also created painted maps for the Arts and Craft houses including Lindisfarne Castle, magnificent murals for Cunard liners, and eye-catching publicity posters. An enduring legacy is his alphabet for the Imperial War Graves Commission as used on all British military headstones since the First World War.



Our lecturer **Caroline Walker** spends much of her time researching the Gill brothers. She has co-curated exhibitions, organised events, and runs the MacDonald Gill website.

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Theodore of Tarsus, Archbishop of Canterbury in troubled times

Theodore had several things in common with Justin Welby: despite living in troubled times, and in the aftermath of a severe national plague, he made extensive tours of his archbishopric, spoke at many Synods, and worked tirelessly to unite the bickering factions of the Church in England.

But, unlike Justin Welby, Theodore did not start off as English. He was a Greek living quietly in a Roman monastery when in 664, after Archbishop Deusdedit died, the Pope began looking for a new Archbishop of Canterbury. Theodore was recommended as a good candidate, even though he was not even ordained at the time.

The Pope moved quickly: Theodore was ordained

Rock me gently....

deacon, and four months later (when his hair had grown long enough) he was ordained priest and immediately consecrated bishop. Then he was sent, with some companions, off to Canterbury to be Archbishop. It was a very long journey, but Theodore used the weeks on the road well: by the time he arrived in Canterbury he could at least speak English.

Theodore arrived in Britain in May 669, and soon set about strengthening the leadership of the Church through appointing more bishops, improving administration and order, and setting up a yearly meeting for the whole church.

His main challenge was settling the areas with Celtic tradition, and bringing them

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gently but firmly into the Roman Church. He wisely allowed a blending of



Roman and Celtic traditions, which went well, and which began to give a common and unique identity to the church in Britain.

Theodore's legacy was immense: he is regarded as being the principal force behind the common Church in Britain. He was a gifted theologian and teacher, teaching science, astronomy, law, Latin and Greek. Above all, Theodore was an astute church politician and a visionary leader. Little wonder he is credited with having overseen one of the most fruitful periods of the church in Britain.

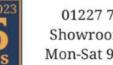
